## Message from Chair & Executive Director

As the world continued working to adapt to a global crisis, at ISCBC we worked to deepen our collaborative experience. In 2021, our partnerships grew and evolved in perhaps the most meaningful and inclusive ways to date. This year we expanded our relationships with Tourism operators across BC and created strong partnerships to build and develop responsible practices and solutions for the Tourism industry. On the Japanese Beetle front, we worked closely with all levels of government and industry to heighten awareness of the destruction this invasive insect can cause. In 2021, we provided training to more than 60 different organizations. And with our Indigenous partners, we facilitated important training to help protect traditional knowledge through better understanding of the threat invasive species pose to traditional practices. We continue to depend on our strong network of Board, staff, advisors, partners and volunteers as we build on the Council's successes and advance our critical work. On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to acknowledge and celebrate the incredible work of everyone who has pushed through challenge and change, and contributed to the ISCBC over the last year.



### **Gail Wallin, Executive Director**

For so many of us, 2021 was again a year of change. For ISCBC, it came with exponential growth. This year asked us to lean in on one of our historic strengths training and re-training people who lose jobs or find themselves out of work. This year we played an important economic role, offering a new path to people in British Columbia who lost jobs due to the pandemic or were seeking new directions, providing them with skill sets needed to 'work for the environment'. As a result of partnerships with the province, the federal government and others, the size of our staff exploded – empowering us to dramatically expand our reach, and to protect biodiversity by preventing the spread of invasive species. With a growing awareness of the role of invasive species in exacerbating the environmental impacts of extreme climate events like floods, fires and environmental degradation, there is much more work to do. Thank you for your continued support, dedication and trust.

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## **Building a Community Science Network**

Our network of passionate individuals dedicated to their communities and natural spaces keeps growing. Connections facilitated here support accessibility in conservation, bringing a strong sense of place within and between communities. Our goal is to grow a network of motivated individuals across BC who can identify invasive species, have the tools they need to report new invaders and who are empowered to take actions that protect the natural spaces where we live, work and play.

### Learn.

We launched one of our most exciting and engaging new educational tools in 2021. Our Community Science eLearning courses give people across the province knowledge on the impacts of invasive species through the lens of climate change and biodiversity decline, tools to observe and report nature around them and actions to support biodiversity protection through the adoption of responsible practices and new habits.

## Report.

Observing and reporting is critical to the protection of BC's biodiversity. It establishes a baseline on which conservation efforts are built and helps locate new infestations of invasive species. Joining the national "I Spy and Identify" project on iNaturalist will ensure that all future observation data is added to our network, allowing us to track both invasive and vulnerable species populations across the province.





### **Take Action.**

Members of our Community Science Network have access to a virtual community science kit that empowers them to protect biodiversity and prevent the spread of invasive species. The kit includes monthly e-newsletters, engagement opportunities via social media, online learning courses and webinars, activity sheets, invasive and native species reporting highlights and successes and hands-on event opportunities in their local communities.









### **Volunteer Youth Team**

In 2021, ISCBC was nominated as a finalist for the Best Youth Engagement Organization (20+ Staff) Award, as part of the Charity Village Conference and Awards. The nomination recognizes our strong engagement and approach that resonates with youth and inspires them to take action. Since 2019, we've inspired over 486 youth across BC to give back to their communities and the environment.


# Accessible & Trusted Learning

The launch of our specialized ISCBC Learning Centre in 2021 grew our network of people and organizations passionate about protecting biodiversity. We built on the success of our 2020 training programs, developing new courses and resources on a variety of invasive species topics, including Pesticide Applicator Certification, PlantWise, tourism and invasive species, and observing and reporting invasive species.

## Fostering Positive Behaviours & Responsible Practices

Inspiring positive behaviours and actions is vital to managing and preventing the further spread of invasive species. We strengthened on-the-ground actions and encouraged shifts toward responsible practices through the delivery of key behaviour change programs.

We worked in over 151 communities and expanded our virtual reach through public service announcements and social media platforms. Our behaviour change programs continue to grow and expand, creating positive impacts in our natural spaces and communities.

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### **Building a Stronger BC**

Supporting BC's economy, environment and society is a priority for us. In the 2021 field season, we completed monitoring and management of high priority lands and waters spanning all corners of the province.

Action Teams received training, support and field experience in surveying inventory, management and reporting of invasive species.



## **Protection of Critical Aquatic Habitats**

We sampled eleven Cariboo lakes for invasive Zebra and Quagga mussels, building on 2020's collaborative efforts. To date, no invasive Zebra or Quagga mussels have been detected in BC waterways.







## **Prioritizing Indigenous Lands & Traditions**

We are proud to be able to work with Indigenous communities and partners throughout the province. By facilitating the Indigenous Invasive Species Network (IISN), we collaborate with our First Nations partners and communities to address invasive species issues, share solutions, and learn how we, as a Council, can best support their communities.

Collectively, we've developed and delivered training, community outreach, equipment and customized invasive plant management plans. We've partnered with the Métis Nation of BC to offer training to nearly 40 youth, delivered a school outreach initiative and prioritized Indigenous Cultural Awareness training for all our staff, enabling continuous learning and growth.

We led three school outreach workshops – including two province-wide professional development workshops for educators, and one regional professional development day.

### **Tourism For Tomorrow**



# Collaborate To Eradicate JAPANESE BEETLE

Working together to eradicate Japanese beetle (*Popillia japonica*) in BC takes strong partnerships and great coordination. With the help and dedication of our partners, our collective work has resulted in a 63% reduction of beetles over 2020, and an overall reduction in beetles since program inception in 2019 by a total of 93%.





### **ASIAN GIANT HORNET**

Building on the importance and need to have public 'watching and reporting', we supported provincial work to increase engagement and support monitoring of Asian giant hornet (Vespa mandarinia) traps along the Washington-BC border. Our website and the Report Invasives app were the key digital tools used for public inquiries and to log suspected reports. We provided education on this new invasive through outreach and sharing of new information and resources.

## **Together in Action Awards**

The Together in Action Innovation and Leadership awards (TIA) were developed by the ISCBC in honour of our Executive Director Gail Wallin's innovative leadership, provincially and nationally, in the area of invasive species. This year ISCBC was delighted to recognize two individuals who went above and beyond by contributing their time and leadership for the prevention and management of invasive species in BC.

### John Kang, **Together in Action Student** Leadership Award.

John is a student at the University of Victoria where he has coordinated several weed pulls and secured funding for the protection of Garry Oak Meadows John started volunteering with ISCBC in 2020. At the time of his award, John had dedicated 320



hours of community service to local invasive species removal and habitat improvement.

### Conway Lum, **Together in Action Innovation** and Leadership Award.

Conway, of GardenWorks, has been passionate for years in the fight against invasive species, including European fire ant, Chafer beetle and Japanese beetle. He is a strong advocate for the horticulture industry and



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proactive in public outreach to help create awareness and stop the spread of invasive species. Most recently, as a resident in the Japanese Beetle Regulated Area, Conway has taken on the responsibility of monitoring and reporting the status of beetle traps to the Canadian Food Inspection Agency and others.
